Discussion – anything else relevant to the observation that will aid the committee in evaluating it:	The birds were very confiding, but most BB Whistling Ducks I have seen in PA as well as TX and FL have been fairly tame. The owner of the property (Scott) told me he first saw the flock fly in about 4 days prior. He immediately knew what they were since he used to be a waterfowl aficionado and actually had a pair of BB Whistling ducks for a time about 10 years ago. He said that these were clearly wild birds and does not know of anyone owning this species in the area. A strange coincidence, however, I believe they are likely wild birds given the larger flock size and the large influx of birds at this same time (at least two more large flocks in PA, some in NJ and some as far north as Nova Scotia). My understanding is that some of these other birds (like the ones in nearby Berks county) are also fairly confiding and even being fed (like many I have seen in TX).
