Large duck with red bill, grey upper neck and face with white eyering, pink-red legs, black belly, white wing stripe while at rest. Rockstar mohawk look from the chestnut brown body color that extends up the back of the neck and over the top of the head. Skinny-necked appearance.

Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)

Foraging during our observation. It was standing belly deep in the water and would fully submerge its head for long periods, then come up seemingly more to scan for danger than to eat the mouthful it had collected.

Nothing similar in this region.
