OTHER OBSERVERS (only those who saw and identified the bird with you): Richard Fagan was with me when I found it at Peace Valley and followed me to Pine Run, but could not identify it even after I told him what it was. **HABITAT** (e.g. mowed field, woodland edge, any other details Lakes. Seen once on mowed weedy edge of lake.

DESCRIPTION (Include as much detail as you observed – size relative to other species present; "jizz" = e.g. posture, body shape, and proportions; colors and patterns of plumage; bill, eye, and leg characteristics; other features relevant to this individual): It has a short bill, bright pink in the middle with a black base and tip, and pink feet. The body is mid grey-brown, the head and neck a richer, darker brown, the rump and vent white, and the tail grey with a broad white tip. The upper wing-coverts are of a somewhat similar pale bluish-grey as in the <u>Greylag Goose</u>, and the flight feathers blackish-grey. The species is most closely related to the <u>Bean Goose</u> <u>Anser fabalis</u> (having even been treated as a <u>subspecies</u> of it at times in the past), sharing a similar black-and-coloured pattern bill, but differing in having pink on the bill and legs where the Bean Goose is orange, and in the paler, greyer plumage tones. It is similar in size to the small *rossicus* subspecies of Bean Goose, but distinctly smaller than the nominate subspecies *fabalis*. It produces a medley of high-pitched honking calls, being particularly vocal in flight, with large skeins being almost deafening.

The bird was a Pink-footed in adult plumage. No feather wear was noted, there were no leg bands, and the bird and the goose flock were very alert to potential danger. Compared to the Canadas, the bird was smaller, shorter necked, smaller rounder headed, and had a shorter stubby bill. The stubby bill had a black tip and lighter gray/black base. The pink (bubblegum) band or saddle on the bill between the tip and the base was clearly visible. The legs were bright bubblegum pink. The head was dark brown. The neck appeared lighter brown overall. The lower neck blended in with the buffy to light brown upper breast. The back was brown and gray/brown with light feather edges. The wings in flight showed dark secondaries and primaries on top. The breast and belly was light tan, going to white lower belly,

undertail coverts, and vent area. The rear flanks were darker brown than the belly or forward flanks. The rear flank feathers had lighter edges. A white border formed where the wings folded into the flanks. The tail had a narrow white tip, then a broader black band, and finally white upper tail coverts.

BEHAVIOR (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing) It was preening almost continuously on 11/28 including splashing around in the water and taking short splashing flights. On other days, the bird was also observed to be preening excessively (Tom Johnson) but no apparent reason could be determined. Other two times I saw it was just floating in the mob of geese. It was wary as were the other geese. At Peace Valley the whole goose flock flushed due to a kayak that really wasn't that close. At Pine Run, it moved away in the water with the flock as we walked at some distance from the water. As birders got closer to water's edge on other days, they just moved away to far side of lake.
