3. Observation details

Was it photographed? Not by me. Videotaped? Not by me. Sound recording made? Not by me.

Optical equipment used: Kowa TSN2 scope with 30x wide angle eyepiece, Swift Audubon 8.5 x 44 binoculars.

Camera/other equipment used: None.

Distance from bird: several hundred yards.

Weather and light conditions: The weather was sunny and cold (20s or 30s). At the time of the observation, the sun was on the eastern side of the sky, so that the light came from in front of us as we watched the bird. This produced a great deal of glare when looking straight across the lake. Luckily, the bird was not between us and the sun, but off to the right side, so we could see it better.

4. Experience

Indicate your prior experience with this and similar species. I have seen one Barnacle Goose before, a flyby bird at Suomenlinna island in Helsinki, Finland, in May 1999. I have a great deal of experience with Canada Geese (B. canadensis) and Brant (B. bernicla); also with blue morph Snow Goose (Chen caerulescens), which a Barnacle could resemble from certain angles; a "Blue" Goose was present at Lake Galena on 3 December. I have also seen the various European Anser geese in Scandinavia.

What books, illustrations, and advice did you consult? The Collins Bird Guide by Killian Mullarney et al., National Geographic guide (3rd edition).

How long have you been birding? Twelve years as of September 2000.

Was this report written from notes made during or after the observation, or from memory? From notes written during the observation; a copy of the notes and field sketch is attached.

The Barnacle Goose looked a great deal like the hundreds of Canada Geese also on Lake Galena; surprisingly so, in fact. Especially with the light conditions, from certain angles (most notably when the head was turned away) it looked like another Canada as the glare made the Barnacle's gray tones appear more brownish. From the front, the white face on the black neck recalled Long-tailed Duck (Clangula hyemalis). The head seemed somewhat small in proportion to the neck, which in turn seemed a bit slim in proportion to the body, so it seemed slightly ill-proportioned. On the other hand, the neck seemed somewhat thick, especially down toward where it joined the body. The black of the neck came up onto the top of the head; only in a side or front view was the white face visible. The bill was small and dark; dark lores joined it to the dark eyes so that bill, lores and eyes seemed to be one unit.

The largely gray back was barred with black and white, making a very trim appearance when the light was good. These conspicuous edgings age the bird as an adult; an immature Barnacle would not have white edgings to the back feathers. The bird's sides were gray as well, contrasting with white undertail coverts and a black tail. All in all, when the light was right, it was a very neatly patterned bird. In size, it was somewhat smaller than the Canadas and was frequently lost to view behind the bigger geese.

Name the species you consider ID contenders; explain how you eliminated each.

The main confusion species would be the other *Branta* geese; the black, gray and white color scheme does not fit the *Anser* geese. The white face and lack of brown tones in the plumage rule out any of the Canada Goose complex. The white face also rules out any of the Brant subspecies.


Possibly the most troublesome confusion bird would be a "Blue" Goose, with its white head on a dark neck, but a "Blue" Goose has a dark gray body, not the paler gray found on the Barnacle Goose. A "Blue" Goose's head is typically all white with white extending partway down the neck, not white with black coming onto the top of the head; the "Blue" Goose at Lake Galena showed this pattern. A "Blue" Ross' Goose (C. rossii) would be more likely to show black continuing onto the top of the head, but also has dark gray body plumage and is too small for a Barnacle. Both of these Chen geese also have paler bills than does a Barnacle Goose, and the eye is isolated in the white face, not joined to the dark bill by dark lores. This gives a completely different "expression."

Finally, a partial albino can be ruled out because of the neatness of this bird's markings, and the fact that it shows the classic Barnacle Goose pattern. A partial albino of a different species would likely have a more irregular pattern or would have other features that would not be typical of a Barnacle Goose.

Whether or not this individual is a wild bird, however, is not a question I can answer on the knowledge I have. I am satisfied that this bird is in fact a Barnacle Goose; where it comes from, I would rather not speculate.
