Thank you for sending in the documentation of the Trumpeter Swans you saw at the Haines-Seville wetlands restoration area in April of 2001. The description, field notes and sketch are excellent. As you suspected the committee voted 5-2 to place the record in the unknown origins category. No one disputed the identification, but with an active restoration program in progress in Ontario and Ohio the likelihood is that the bird was released. At this point I don't think any Trumpeter Swan other than a banded wild bird would be accepted in PA. However, in my view, this makes documenting the birds that do occur all the more important since they seem to be establishing themselves and routinely wandering into the state.



Time - (1030-1130) CONDITIONS - SURNY, breezy The two Trumpeter Swans were along the southwestern edge of the marsh, feeding along the shallow corners of the tract. The wetlands trail offered a close vantage [about 100 feet) point to the swans. These two individuals DID NOT have a neck band and one did not appear to have a leg band. They did seem to be relatively "tame." BODY: very large and mostly white. One bird exhibited completely white plumnage. The other bird was white with some grayish wash (faint) in the wing areas. LEGS: black BILL: both birds showed an all black bill with a little red-orange stripe separating upper and lower bill. There was a slight protuberance ridge along the top (See drawings for angles and slape) wery long neck, black eyes + lores blending into bill BACK: profile shape was evenly rounded on both birds. (PLEASE SEE ATTACHED NOTES FOR FURTHER DESCREPTION) Although these two birds are probably considered "escapes" or part of the "reintro duction program." It's nice to see these birds using a wetlands restoration area (five years ago it was a meadow / field) develope created by PENDOTO After seeing the birds. I drove to Mike Newell's house (in Harrisonville) and he told me he know the swans been there for a few days, and he thought they looked like trumpeters, but wasn't look size
