Dear Grier,

Thank you for submitting documentation on the Pacific Loon at Strubel Lake on 23 April 1999. After careful review, the Committee has voted not to accept this record.

One member voted in favor of acceptance, but the other six members felt that the amount of detail describing the bird's plumage (we suppose partly because of the poor lighting conditions) was not sufficient to rule out other loon species.

Non-acceptance does not imply that the bird was not a Pacific Loon, but simply that the Committee believes the documentation does not support the identification conclusively.

We hope that our decision in this particular case will not discourage you from submitting reports on any future rarities you find.
