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Thank you for submitting the description of the storm-petrel you found on Sept. 19, 2003 at Fort Hunter. The record was unanimously accepted as a storm-petrel sp., but the majority of committee members did not feel the description included sufficient details of plumage to rule out other more likely species, especially Band-rumped. I have personally seen Bandrumped Storm-Petrels feeding like a Wilson's on pelagic trips off of North Carolina and according to leaders on those trips, Band-rumps tend to "dissappear" once they join feeding flocks in the wake of the boat. I found this too be quite true, and although I have only seen a handful of the species they are easier to pick out and identify when they fly-by at nearmedium distance when the wing-shape and flight style make them more distinctive.

Feeding and flight styles described for storm-petrels and other seabirds are average differences of species in their usual habitats. They are useful for recognizing birds in pelagic conditions but are at best a first hint at an identification and are not diagnostic. This is especially true when trying to identify storm-blown birds in stressed condition in unusual habitats. In these situations it is doubly important to confirm identification with plumage or structural characters. This is not to say that you made a make in identifying this bird, and it is worth mentioning that a unique feature of Hurricane Isabel was the number of Wilson's Storm-Petrel it deposited inland.

Thanks again for taking the time to send the documentation and help document what turned out to be an unprecedented Hurricane fall out.
