Long wings protruded behind body, seemed to cross in back - gave appearance of forked tail. No white was visible on sides while perched in water - it looked totally black (see photo). Bill was noticeable - pretty long (less than width of head, but notable). It spent most of its time sitting on the water - no motion. At one point it lifted briefly from water while I had it in scope – and it presented a bold white rump patch

visible, which seemed to be in two patches, but continued completely across rump. On the extended
