## **Description**

There were Canada geese, a few mallards and a spotted sandpiper in the rocks below the dam. A great blue heron flew in and then two smaller herons, one a green and the other the tricolor. All three were visible from the same location at the same time for size comparison. I already had my spotting scope out looking at the spotted sandpiper and the green heron and casually put the scope on the third heron. It was intermediate in size between the great blue and green, closer in size to the green. The neck was very long for the bird and initially was extended upward. The bird was a dark blue-grey and white on the belly with streaks of white extending up the chest. There were no plumes on the neck consistent with it being a non-breeding adult. It is a bird I am very familiar with from years birding in Florida and I did not realize it was reportable or I might have spent more time trying to get a photo

Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)

Landed on beach and extended head upwards for 10 sec or so Walked a little on beach and then flew into trees along shore and out of view

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

No other bird I know of has those markings. A great blue and green heron were visible at the same time along the dam and the size was clearly intermediate. The white belly and white streaks up the chest excluded a little blue and the color excluded a reddish egret. The neck was far too long for a night heron
