Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

Distinctive shape. Falcon-like but with notched tail and often folded but open when needed during flight. Short outer primaries visible. White secondaries visible when the bird soared. Oveall gray color with black tail and pale head; tail unbanded. Flight was active as opposed to other soaring birds, more twists, dives, turns, very active flight.

The homeowners that discovered the bird entered very close photos into ebird. The bird often perched in a tree next to their driveway.
