It was interacting with me really - I walked along a few times, and it kept running along to keep up. Some other people walked past at one point, and it went out of sight a bit, but then it came back near me. It wasn't really eating or anything, just seeming to be enjoying the day.
Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)	The only 2 possibilitis were Snowy or Piping Plover, and Snowy Plovers don't have orange legs. It also had a rather clear black block on its tail, visible when flying, which further confirms it as Piping, not Snowy.
