## Long-billed Dountcher in Erie County

On Saturday September 22rd 1990, I was birding at Grull Point on Preoque Isle State Pork. Shortly after dawn (7.15 a.m.), Jerry and Linda M'williams amived with a small group of people from Erie Audubon Society. One member of the group, Dora Porter, located a dountther, Limnodromus sp. which Jerry promptly identified as a juvenile Long-billed Dountcher, L. scolopaceus and then proceeded to attract my attention.

The bird was feeding actively in sparse vegetation at the edge of a small pond. It was remarkably confiding and allowed me to approach to inthintwenty feet and obtain some photographs (see enclosed). Identification of the bird was based upon the following characters:

The bead breast and mantle were mid-gray with the crown being a darker shade of gray. Athin, black eyestripe extended from the base of the bill to well behind the eye. A prominent white supercitiums also extended from the bill base to well behind the eye. The scapulars were dark gray-brown with prominent towny yellow edges, this being the most colorful part of the bird. The unity coverts were gray with black feather shafts, paler whitish adops and buttish ties. The tortials were dark

gray with narrow buffish - white edges, but otherwise they were unmarked. The primaries were black with very narrow white edges at the tips, indicating the freshness of the plumage. The tips of the tolded usings extended almost to the tip of the tail. The breast was gray with this black streaks at the sides and sparse black spots at the sides of the lower nack. There was a cinnamon buff tinge to the lower breast and Hanks with some gray mothing on the flanks. The belly was grayish white. The undertail coverts were white with four longitudinal rows of prominent black chewrons and bars and a few spots. The tail was barred black and white, the black bars being slightly under than the white ones. In flight the prominent white rump patch extended as a "V" up the back. The white trailing. edge to the secondaries could also be soon in flight. The bill was extremely bong, approximately turie the length of the head, stout at the base and straight. It was black with a bluish - gray basal third. The lags were fairly long and groupish - green. The call was a fairly quiet, shorp "keek, heard about a dozen times, but always uttered singly. The bird fed with the characteristic "sewing-machine probing action characteristic of the genus and reminded me of a Common Snipe, Gallingo gallingo in this respect. Total observation time was approximately. 45 minutes. Weather conditions were stormy with ta 25 mile per hour north - westerly wind blowing.
