LONG-BILLED DOWITCHERS IN CRAWFORD COUNTY, PI

On Saturday October 7th 1995 my unfe Cheryl and I were birding at Millers Ponds, Py maturing, Grawford Co. One of the ponds had a low water level and at least 20 feet of mud were exposed around the edges. About 100 yards away from the dut road I noticed a group of 8 downtchers, Limnodromus sp. on the for side of the pond. The birds appeared very gray and, partly due to the late date I began to suspect that they may be Long-billed Downtchers, L. Scolopaceus. Over the course of the next few minutes the birds flew twice and ended up on the area of mud closest to the road, about 50 yards away. By this time I could clearly see that they were juwerile Long-billed Downtchers in pre-basic molt,

Their overall plumage was very gray, aspecially on the head, neck and breast. The supercilium was white and quite pronounced, extending behind the eye. The mantle feathers, ocapulars and coverts were dark gray with dull yellowish white edges. On several birds some plain gray basic plumage ocapulars we present. The tertials were dark gray with thin yellowish white edges. These feathers had plain centers. The belly was mainly white and the flanks were barred black, otrongly so in at least 2 of the birds. The tail was barred black and white, the black bars being wider than the white ones. The undertail coverts were white, spotted with black. Although bull length is not diagnostic in downthers and can only be used as an indicator at best, several of these bird did have extremely long bills, longer than I ever

recall seeing on a Short-billed Dountcher, L. groeus In summary these birds were identified as juverile (pre-basic) Long-billed Dourtchers based on the tollowing characters: \_ 1. Most juverile feather still retained. Only basic feather invere some plain gray scapulars on several birds. Juverile teathers appeared quite wom-2. Tertials had plain centres and thin pale edges unlike broader orange edges and internal marbling on tertials .... Lin Short - billed Dountcher. 3. Tail pattern of alternating under black and narrow white bars is strongly indicative of long-billed Dourtcher.

4. Extremely long bills on several of the birds-The birds were observed in tading light (6.00 p.m.) for about 20 minutes through x 10 binocular and x30 spotting scope ... I have extensive experience of long-billed Dourtchers from California and have also seen this sp. in Arizona, New York, Delaware, England (1), Scotland (1) and also previous bird in Pennsylvania. I also have - extensive experience of all 3 races of Short-billed .... Douitcher in all plumages. The same of the sa
