Subject: Sighting of Sabine's Gull in Lancaster County, Pennsylvania

About 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, September 23, 1989, Dan and Lori Heathcote found an imm. Sabine's Gull flying near Rookery Island in the Susquehanna River, Washington Boro, Pennsylvania. The bird was viewed for about one (1) hour and could not be relocated from the shore later in the day.

Before 7:00 a.m. on Sunday, September 24, 1989, the bird was relocated by boat in the Conejohela Flats area of the Susquehanna River, Washington Boro, where the bird was observed until 1:30 p.m. The bird was photographed extensively by three of the observers, sometimes within 40 feet. On Sunday, the bird spent a lot of time resting on mudflats and often picking "shorebird-like" on mudflats close to the edge of the water.

On Friday, September 22, 1989, remnants of Hurricane Hugo passed northward through western Pennsylvania and an intense cold front (moving from west to east) followed on Saturday into eastern Pennsylvania. At the time of the initial sighting, conditions were clear and calm. By early afternoon, cloud cover and windy conditions (30 mph) prevailed. Sunday, September 24, was calm and pleasant. At least eight (8) observers were present on Sunday, including Jerry Book, Tom Garner, Dan and Lori Heathcote, Robert M. Schutsky, Jan, Pat, and Eric Witmer.

This sighting is a first record for Lancaster County.

All proper field marks should be easily noted in the two enclosed photographs made by Jan A. Witmer and taken with a 35 mm camera using a 600 mm lens and ektachrome 200 ASA film.

360-02-1989 LANCASTER COUNTY'S FIRST RECORD OF SADINE'S GULL On the morning of Saturday, September 23, as Hugo pressed to the west of Pennylounda, the call went out that Sabives Gull had been seen by Dan and Laure Heathcate on the Susquehana. Kiver at the Conepokela Flata just south of Washington Boro, By the time several club members could leterally drop what they were doing and head to this area, the winds had slifted to the north and were accompanied by driving min showers. The bird could not be relocated in spite of thorough abservation from several vantage points, and it was feared that the strong winds carried it southward. The "boot people", as they've been dubbed by Gob Schutckry, had already planned to go out the next day to see what spilled out of / Jugo's words and the approaching cold front. They were, and stillare, kicking themselves for not leing out Saturday morning. Numerous sloreburds were noted by Annard Laurie flying around the roact expanses of much created by Sofe Harbor Dom's draw-down of the water above in anticipation of heavy rains. Buff-breasted Landpiper and Red Knots were seen by them from shore. at 6:00 A.M. Sunday morning, an lour before survise, Serry Gook launched his boat from the end of Blue Rock Road in Ropes that the age old adage "the early bird gets the worm would hald true. The "worm" was nearly run into at 6:10 A.M. by the boat under electric motor power. Even though little light was available, at fifteen feet it was possible to determine that the bird was probably a Sabires Full. The boat was unne deatery returned to shore hurrubly beached, and a fast drive was made to a nearby plane. after a couple of calle

were made to encourage those were planning to explore the Flats that morning to move quickly, the bost was launched again. The - bird was quickly relocated on the south end of " Lenside Island feeding with numerous shoreburds. Not wanting to distart it, and _ wordering what uns on the other side of the island, ferry trudged through the mud to the west side. It wasn't long until a Romendous yell was heard coming from the boat lounch site. Figuring someone had either flown from home in record time, or was in the clutches of a griggly lear, he ran through the mud (walking is tough) to a location where he could see Tom Garner's standing on shore. Tom uns ferried out and the gull was soon found feeding on nearly "Knot foland.". Shorthy afterword, Eric, Jak, and Pot Witmen and Bab Schutaky arrived and their boat "full" of people and gear slowly plowed its way toward the islands. While they were still a distance away, the bind got up and flew southwest out of sight. They did not see it. _____ d till hopeful, many areas were searched. No luck / Finally, someone got a glimpse the bird near a small mudflat downwer. Once again we looded the bosts and picked our way through the shallow uster. We approched to within a hundred yords and started to set up shop to observe Farcacter County's first Salves Full. With that, the bird fleur directly over our heads, giving a quick but barely satisfactory look. The search continued and it was later relocated on Seaside Aland, but prompty mored upmier to "Sharptail Island", where it settled down for a while. It was here that everyone had the opportunity to absence the bird a great length and at close cange. Van and Laure Heathcate had acrued on shore, and were soon brought out to the island so that the "forders" of the bird could more fully appreciate it at close range. Many photosmaphe use taken to document its occurrence before it flew to "Gall fland" a small mud bar on the west side of the island chain. Sonthe after

After reviewing the days sightings and wondering how the bird got from here to there without being noticed, it was considered plausible that there may have been a second bird. We'll never know, as it or they were rever seen again. Not unnoticed, but playing second fiddle to the star performer, were many species of shorebirds. The species total for the day was fifteen, two better than our previous record for the last three years. Seventeen species were seen during the Hugo weekend. The best shorebind moment was at Sharptail Island, where we could absence all five "peeps", White-rumped, Bairds, Western, Semi-palmated, and Least Sandpipers, in a ten by thirty foot pool of water at the same time. Stilt Sandpipers, Lesser Velloulege, and Pectoral Sandpipers hept them company, while Sanderling, Black -bellied and Semi-palmeted Plover skirted the edges of the pool. It had been a magnificent day / Vet in the back of our minds we couldn't help but worder what we had mussed by not being out the previous day when Dan and Lawrie saw small "clouds" of shoreburks drifting among the mud flats. Reat assured that should such a situation be duplicated in the future, the 'boat people' will be on the Flats to see if Hugo's performance can be duplicated or exceeded. _____ Jem Bal
