



Franklin's Gull (*Larus pipixcan*) 338-01-2003

Miller Ponds; Pymatuning Lake Area, Crawford County / October 31, 2003

A basic one Franklin's Gull was found at the Miller Ponds near Pymatuning Lake in Crawford County in mid-October. I searched for the bird on 31 October and found it resting on the ground near one of the ponds in the area. I also saw it in flight as it fed in a plowed field.

DESCRIPTION:

- A small gull, smaller than Ring-billed Gulls which were also present.
- Head: white with a partial black hood. The hood covered the ear coverts and the nape, with lighter black on the rear crown. The black was darkest on the sides of the face. There were bold white crescents above and below the eye. The forehead and chin were white.
- The hood was set off from the rear of the neck by the lighter color of the neck. The neck was whitish, with a light gray wash, much lighter than the black in the hood and the gray of the mantle. This gray color extended along the sides of the neck below the head and in front of the shoulder.
- The mantle and scapulars were pearly gray. Wing coverts were light brown, indicating first winter plumage. Primaries black with white tips (seen on the folded wing). The folded wings projected beyond the tail.
- Breast, sides and belly white.
- Bill: black, and finer than a Ring-billed Gull. The legs and feet were black.
- In flight, the tail showed a black subterminal band with white tipped retrices. The wings were gray with black primaries and blackish coverts, forming a black leading edge to the wing. The wing pattern indicated a basic one bird (lacking the white band separating the black primaries from the gray wings). The underside of the wings were whitish with black on the underside of the primaries.

COMPARISON WITH OTHER GULLS:

Bonaparte's Gull (*Larus philadelphia*) - Bonaparte's Gulls are smaller than Franklin's. At this time of year, adults and basic one birds would lack a hood—they would only show a black ear covert spot and no bold eye crescents. The head of Bonaparte's at this time of year is largely white. The bill of a Bonaparte's is finer compared to a Franklin's Gull. In flight, Bonaparte's are more ternlike than Franklin's, with a completely different wing pattern with a white wedge on the leading edge of the wing in adults and the brownish carpal bar on basic one birds is very different from Franklin's wing pattern.

Laughing Gull (*Larus atricilla*) - An adult Laughing Gull at this time of year (in basic plumage) lacks an obvious hood; light black is confined to the ear covert area and a thin line from eye to eye across the crown. Laughing Gull has less bold eye crescents and has a larger heavier bill compared to a Franklin's Gull. The white tips to the primaries in adult basic Laughing Gulls are smaller than in Franklin's Gull.

Basic one Laughing Gulls have a lot of gray in the head and neck, extending along the sides of the breast. The gray is darker than the gray on the nape of the Franklin's Gull, so there is very little contrast between the head and neck on a basic one Laughing Gull. The gray blends from the head into the neck and on to the mantle. Franklin's shows much more contrast in these areas. Basic one Laughing Gulls do not show white tips to the folded primaries.

The underside of a Laughing Gull's wings are mottled brownish, not clear white as in Franklin's Gull.

Laughing Gulls are larger birds, less petite than Franklin's Gulls, more elongated.

Franklin's Gulls, Millers Pond, Pymatuning Lake, Crawford County, PA 11/1/03

Visited the site to see the previously reported Franklin's Gull. Found the Franklin's roosting on the dike next to the pond with some Ring-billed Gulls. The Franklin's then flew across the road in a dirt field and began feeding on earthworms. As I was watching the Franklin's, I was surprised to see a second Franklin's come into view. One of the Franklin's had more black on the back of the head, while the other Franklin's had a small band of black around the back of the head. Both birds had the broad white eye crescents and dark somewhat pinkish legs. On at least one of the birds I noticed a little bit of white on the tips of the wings when it flew. Both birds had white outer tail feathers with a dark band at the tip of the tail. Both birds appeared to be in first-winter plumage.

We drove to look for the reported Franklin's Gull arriving around noon. The attached photographs are good, I'll keep this brief. A few moments after arriving we saw a flock of gulls flying in from the distance. In flight, one bird appeared darker overall and that with the jizz of its flight made it stand out. The flock of birds flew right at us and around us, we could see the half-hooded look of the head and knew this was the bird we wanted to see. The flock of Ring-billed Gulls and one assumed Franklin's Gull flew over us, around us and fed in a field right next to us and the road. We approached the assumed Franklin's within 30 feet. It walked in the field with the other RbGu's and flocked with them across the road in front of the ponds. The head and neck looked slimmer than the Ring-billed Gulls. The overall size was a little smaller.

They have pale gray central tail feathers and white eye crescents. Breeding adults has a medium size orange bill and orange legs.


