Description

This was a very small tern (other terns and gulls were present for comparison - see photos) with a relatively narrow black bill, a blackish eyeline extending toward the back of the head and a mostly whitish body.

It was much smaller than all the other terns and gulls that were present. The only tern that would have been that way is a Least Tern.

The photos that are attached are not very good since they were an early attempt by me at digiscoping using a hand held camera over the eyepiece. However, they do show the small size of the bird, the whitish body and you can make out the black eyeline in the blown up shots. The bird is in the center of the more distant photo preening. The blown up shots have it to the right of the Canada Goose.

Yes, it could not be any other type of tern. It was just too small.
