Description	Two jeagers sittng together on the water. I could see the jeager shape and the dark forehead and crown with the light gray/buffy nape extending to the throat. the bill was dark and the wings were dark. The chest

was also dark, but not as dark as the wings. I was looking at the tail for the tail extention, but could not see them. I waited for the birds to fly, and after a half an hour, the birds took off together and circled, then I could see two short pointed tail extentions. The wings of course, were long and pointed with a light patch on the underside near the tip.

Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)

As above, the birds were sitting on the water. After about a half hour of watching them, the birds lifted up circled and and eventually, lost them in the clouds.

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

Birds that would be similar would be the other jeagers or a skua.

It was not heavy enough to be a skua. The wings were too narrow and a squa would not have tail extiontions. And the light nape extending to the throat would also rule out a skua.

As for the other jeagers, it did not look like a Pomarine, because the bill was small and all dark. And the tail extentions were pointed.

It did not look like a Long-tailed because the plumage did not match.

Discussion - anything else relevant to the observation that will aid the committee in evaluating it:

These birds looked like the picture in the Sibley guide on page 198 bottom middle. The Intermediate adult breeding, but without the tail extentions. So I am thinking the bird must not be a full adult since the tail extentions were short. And the way this bird has the dark fore head and crown with the buffy nape looks just like my two birds. I don't see the other two jeagers on the other pages looking like this.

In my birding experience, I have seen many jeagers, but all have been light phases.
