#### Description

Copied from my eBird report:

First county record found by Steve Pinkerton, David Brown, Bobby Brown, and Deb Brown. First seen around 7:05am and was seen until at least 7:42am. Decent south winds overnight with a storm system moving through in the early morning hours, but it was not particularly strong.

Jaeger silhouette was immediately apparent, with the gull-like shape and long central tail feathers. Size appeared fairly large in the field, and the bird briefly joined a flock of Bonaparte's Gulls and a Ring-billed Gull, where it appeared comparable in size to the RBGU. The bird also had a brief confrontation with a Common Tern, but they quickly went their separate ways.

The bird was always in flight, but skimmed low over the water on a few occasions. The bird was often soaring over the lake. When flapping, wingbeats were fairly even.

#### Similar species:

Long-tailed Jaeger: Ruled out due to a combination of size, flapping style, and body structure. The wings on a LTJA are longer and more slender than this bird shows.

Pomarine Jaeger: Ruled out due to pointed central tail feathers rather than broad/rounded.

Overall, the bird shows a textbook Parasitic Jaeger shape.

## Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)

Was only seen in flight. Other behavior details found in description section above.

## Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

Proportionally small, triangular head shape and the correctly shaped and sized tail for Parasitic

Long-tailed Jaeger: Ruled out due to a combination of size, flapping style, and body structure. The wings on a LTJA are longer and more slender than this bird shows. Head and tail also incorrect for this species.

Pomarine Jaeger: Ruled out due to pointed central tail feathers rather than broad/rounded. Would be heftier as well.
