DescriptionBright yellow chest and belly, whitish throat, gray head with a light nape. Long, heavy black bill. The back appeared to greenish-gray, the wings gray with light colored streaks in them. The tail was brown, and notched.

Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)

It would fly from tree to tree, usually along the river, but occasionally going inland. It called several times. It was basically staying along the river, going upstream, then downstream.

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)	Notched tail, no white outer tail feathers, and the call ruled out Western, and Couch's Kingbird. The yellow chest ruled out Cassin's Kingbird.
Discussion – anything else relevant to the observation that will aid the committee in evaluating it:	The bird was originally identified as a Western Kingbird, but when the call was heard, it was identified as a Tropical Kingbird.
Are you positive of your identification ? (Why or why not)	Yes. There were many expert birders there, and they taught me the difference between this bird and the similar species.

Previously identified bird, first found nearby; refound along Riverview Road. Clear Tyrannus ssp. Bright yellow breast, rises farther up breast than typical for Western Flycatcher. White throat, gray crown & forehead. Darker gray lore and behind eye. Mantle olive washed gray. Tail dark brown, not black and lacks obvious white outer vane of Western. Color of wings match color of tail. light edging to full length of tail feathers, also white edges along primaries and secondaries. Tail slightly but obviously forked. Relatively heavy bill, but in field did not appear heavy as looked in Sibley's. Did not vocalize while I observed; however distinguished from Couch's Flycatcher by call, earlier by other observers.

Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)

Actively feeding; perching on power wires and nearby barbed wire fencing. Flying up and down to corn field stubble, occasionally catching grasshoppers etc.. Sometimes perched on corn stalks.

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

Most obvious possibilities are Western Flycatcher or Couch's. Western easier to rule out. Yellow on breast farther up breast than typical for Western Flycatcher. Tail dark brown, not black and lacks obvious white outer vane of Western. Color of wings match color of tail, rather than the darker tail of Western. Light edging to full length of tail feathers, unlike typical on Western. Tail more obviously notched than Western. Relatively heavy bill, though if field impression was not as big a difference as shown in Sibley's.

Couch's Kingbird harder to eliminate. Unfortunately, did not vocalize while I observed; however distinguished from Couch's Flycatcher by call earlier in morning and previous day by other observers, including Jason Horn. Several made recordings; hopefully they'll submit to PORC. Suggestive of Tropical rather than Couch's, however, is the gap between tips of folded secondaries to wingtips appear (in photos attached) short compared to photos of Couch's online and in Birdseye, and certainly compared to long gap in Western.

Discussion – anything else relevant to the observation that will aid the committee in evaluating it:

Since did not hear vocalization to diagnostically rule out Couch's, mainly filing this to provide photos. Hopefully others will submit recordings. Several folks said they had recorded it earlier in the morning.

Are you positive of your identification? (Why or why not)

Yes, except for possible Couch's; for that need vocal ID of others.

DescriptionLarger than nearby bluebirds. Long tail, yellow underparts, gray head. Unable to separate from other yellow-breasted kingbirds with the looks I had, but others have

obtained photos.

Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)

Flycatching, changed perches several times, but usually ended up back at the wire. Appeared to be bobbing tail, but I'm not sure given the distance and glare.

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

Head lighter than Cassin's, lacking strong contrast between head and throat. I believe the gray in Western Kingbird extends further down the breast, though I could be wrong on that. I believe I heard the bird vocalize, which would rule out the very different sounding Couch's (I am familiar with the vocalizations of Tropical, Western, and Couch's).

Discussion – anything else relevant to the observation that will aid the committee in evaluating it:

I am almost certain that I heard the bird. I heard a definite Tropical Kingbird call which sounded like it was coming from the center of the field (near where we saw the bird a few minutes later), but I can't say with absolute certainty that none of the 20 or so other birders present was using playback at that time.

Are you positive of your identification? (Why or why not)	Yes, I am. While the bird was distant, it certainly appeared to be a Tropical/Couch's Kingbird. If the vocalization I heard was the bird as I suspect, and not a recording, than that would clinch the ID.

DescriptionTypical Kingbird appearance, yellow belly, thicker looking bill then Western.

Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)Typical flycatcher behavior, flitting around along high tree top perches, before flying down to a utility wire, and then into this tree. It appeared to be hawking insects and was briefly calling (as can be seen and heard in video) before dipping down into brush along shoreline where it could not be located afterwards, in part due to strong winds and storm front coming in.

Separation from similar
species (How you eliminated others)

Mostly due to other more experienced birders reports. Bird was identified by much more experienced birders while I was there as well. Calls do sound like that of Tropical Kingbird compared to Western, though I don't have much experience with either species, none with the Tropical Kingbird outside of this.

Discussion – anything else relevant to the observation that will aid the committee in evaluating it:

Bird (which had been reported and was identified by other birders) was flying in typical flycatcher fashion from tree to tree and started to call. I stopped taking stills and took this video. Sorry for noisy breathing, that's me, the phone ringing is from the person standing next to me. I didn't catch his name. This bird was witnessed by a number of other birders at this day and time, I just don't know any of their names.

Are you positive of your identification? (Why or why not)

Pretty sure, other more experianced birders had identified the bird, calls sound like recordings I have heard of this species. I have no experaine with this species prior.
