Long totally split tail that was black with white outer edging. Black wings. Light gray head and back. White upper breast

with pink wash to lower sides of breast.

Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)

Moved between pasture fences, wires, and trees. At one point chased by a Mockingbird. Also observed bathing by splashing into a small stream repeatedly from a low pasture wire. Split tail fully spread when it was alighting back onto the wire after these ablutions.

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

Nothing else is really very similar, other than a Fork-tailed Flycatcher or, with a good bit of imagination, a Mockingbird. Mockingbirds do not have the split tail, and one was observed chasing the Scissor-tailed from a tree. Fork-taileds are black on the head, back and wings, without the pink wash to the lower belly.
