Cave Swallow Petrochelidon fulva

Location: Foot of East Avenue, Ene, Ene County, Pa.

Date: November 9, 2005

Time: About 10:25 AM and 10:35 AM

Weather: Cloudy, wind southerly from 10 to 20 mph, temp. 57 F. Thunderstorms followed the

Optics: Zeiss 10 X 40 Binocular and Kowa TSN 4 with eyepiece set at 30X

Viewing distance: as close as 200 feet.

Viewing conditions: fair

Details of sighting and description: After finishing the waterbird count I drove out to the north pier and looked across to the Erie side and immediately spotted two swallows flying west at the foot of east Avenue. I quickly drove there, which is about a 30 minute drive, and as soon as I arrived I spotted three or four swallows flying along the shoreline in my direction (west). At this point I could see that all had square tails and appeared to be pale on the breast and throat. I got the scope on the birds and immediately singled one out, since they all appeared to be the same species. I followed this bird as it ascended from an altitude of at least 200 feet above the water down to just a foot or two above the water. As it flew past me I could clearly see the pale rump and unmarked pale throat and side of face. I also noticed the square tail and dusky undertail coverts. The rest of the upperside was very dark or blackish in appearance. Since it was flying passed very rapidly I had no time to see any more detail. In about ten minutes another couple flew directly over me at about 200 feet high. I could see that at least one of the birds had an unmarked throat and a square tail with dusky undertail coverts. I spent most of the time trying to obtain identifiable photos of the bird as it flew past, but was unsuccessful. After it passed me I got a glimpse of the upperside and could see that it also had a pale rump. I believe all were Cave Swallows based upon size and behavior compared to the two that I was able to obtain fair looks. The buffy rump rules out all other swallows except Cliff Swallow, but these birds had pale unmarked throats. On the first bird I was able to see the pale unmarked face in addition to the pale throat and rump.

I have seen many Cave Swallows in Texas and the southwest. Only a week prior to this sighting, I had observed large numbers flying over the fields at Laguna Atascosa NWR in Texas.
