Description (only what you observed; size relative to other species present; posture, body shape & proportions; colors & patterns of plumage; bill, eye, & leg characteristics; other features relevant to this individual): Small thrush with longish black legs; Gray cap, nape and upper back; white supercilium, gray/black lores, and blackish streaked cinnamon auriculars; pale cinnamon breast, paler toward belly and flanks, and white under tail coverts; slim black bill and black eyes; black primaries, varying degrees of cinnamon in wing coverts, tertials, and adjoining mantle. The striking plumage was the white rump and tail with broad black band. My eyes weren't quick enough to see the black up the middle of the tail when it hopped up in the air. I didn't see it flair its tail as they often do.

Behavior (Be as specific as possible about what the bird was doing): It was mostly standing and running in the field seeking insects. Occasionally jumped into the air as they often do chasing insects.
