The bird was originally found on Sunday, 3/2/08, by Lewis Crowell of East Aurora, NY. Lew is an old friend of mine and a very experienced, lifelong birder. He and his wife had been birding Sinn. State Park on that Sunday afternoon. On Monday, 3/3/08 he e-mailed me and said that he had found a Townsend's and told me where. He said that he had very good looks at the bird. On Tuesday, 3/4/08, I left work in the late morning to search for the bird. As soon as I got to Forty Maples area I found it. It was raining, hard. I watched and followed the bird for at least a half hour and got very close looks. The bird stayed by itself although there were dozens of Robins working the same hawthorne and Multiflora Rose. It was quite active, moving from tree to tree. Often it would perch on one of the hundreds of White Spruce, always at the highest perch. Then back to the hawthornes. I saw good looks at the bold eyering and the buffy wing patches. A longtailed, Catbird sized, slender, gray bird. It sat rather upright and the bill reminded me of a bluebird's, in size. Proportionately, very small. The bird was fairly tame and slow moving. Not lethargic, but quite deliberate. The flight was sort of fluttery and swooping, combined. Not unlike a Blue Jay working in and out of a feeding station. I am 100% sure of this birds identity. I took a couple of photos with an old Nikon point and shoot through my binoculars, with not much luck. Remember, it was raining the whole time. I

then went to get the park manager, Lisa Bainey, also a birder I brought her back to the site and we never re-found the bird. I tried for a couple of days with no luck. I will try to attach at least 1 photo. If unsuccessful I will send seperately.

Positive of ID?: 100% Posture and shape was distinctive. Also had good looks at colors and field marks.

Previous experience with species: A few, years ago, in the Rockies. Also I saw the McKean Co. bird the year before.
