Yesterday as I was watching tv I saw a bird fluttering outside the window.

- > What I saw was a cross between a phoebe and a mocking bird. I made mental
- > note of characteristics ( slight eye bar, fluffy side feathers, about the
- > size of a robin, and white eye rings) as I was no more then 7ft from the
- > bird. I immediately went to my bird book and came to one conclusion:
- > townsend solitaire. I had never heard of this bird outside my book so I
- > looked at the range map and did some research and saw it is rarely this far
- > east. I live in butler, pennsylvania, summit twp. I wondered what the bird
- > was doing fluttering outside the window, when I glanced up and saw a
- > melting icicle, and remembered seeing water dripping from the birds mouth,
- > imput two and two together. It is VERY COLD here (when I woke up the
- > temperature was -10). The bird was drinking from the melting icicle. Very
- > cool. I MAY have seen the bird again later that evening, though it was a
- > flying glance. If it was, it may be hanging around for a little. If anyone
- > would want to try and take pictures feel free to contact me.

Then, (according to the PABirds archives) the next day David Yeany II visited the observer and tried for the bird around the same property.

"I had an opportunity to meet with Adam Hinchberger and search for the possible Townsend's Solitaire that he reported seeing two days ago at a family residence in Butler County. As Adam reported, he saw the bird fairly close by his window drinking water droplet from melting ice. Nearby on the property there are good sources of berries from American holly, Baltic ivy, and junipers. Adam's family's nursery specializes in holly and an adjacent property, as well as nearby Heasley's Nursery, specializes in junipers.

Adam and I thoroughly searched the property and were unable to turn up any Townsend's Solitaire. A small portion of the property also hosts an old orchard with crab apples and other fruit-bearing shrubs where we found a single Northern Mockingbird. We did have a highlight of 13 flyover CANVASBACK among the 20 species of birds we observed there (list below). Adam says he will keep an eye out for the bird to return and let us know if it does.
