Feeding on small green grubs or caterpillars on the cedar branches, almost constantly moving.

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

Only other warb it could be confused with is a black-and-white. But that bird has a white line through its head, it doesn't have yellow eye spots, its face is pale, not obviously marked with dark line below supercilium, and it usually doesn't feed frantically like this one was doing. At times the black-throated gray almost seemed to be flycatching within the trees.

It moved around from one cedar to another for about an hour but then disappeared. It was the first cold day in a while.
