We first encountered the bird as it flew and we noted the white outer tail feathers. Later, while we were sitting on the bench on the crest of the hill, the bird flew to a small deciduous tree to the right of the path and pictures were taken. It sat in the small tree for 5 minutes before flying to the spruce tree line. It was subsequently seen in the upper portions of several of the spruce trees or in open sections of the deciduous trees. It occasionally flew to the weedy grass. It eventually made a late afternoon trip to the a nearby pond and later returned to the tree line on top of the hill.
