Thank you for submitting details on the Clay-colored Sparrow you saw in Media, Delaware County on 9 November 1994 to P.O.R.C. After careful review, we regret that we are unable to accept this record. The committee felt that the documentation submitted does not adequately rule out the possibility of a winter plumaged Chipping Sparrow. Most committee members would have preferred a description of the rump color to make an adequate determination. This does not mean of course, that the bird was not a Clay-colored Sparrow, merely, that the details did not allow for a concrete determination.

We hope that this does not discourage you from submitting documentation on any rare birds you find in the future. Please be encouraged to send as much detail as possible.

## Report of Clay-colored Sparrow

Date: The 9 November 1995

Time: 4:00 PM

Place: Media, Del Co.

Weather: Partly cloudy, Low-mid 40's, wind 10-15-14

After work on Thursday afternoon I was watching the birds at my feeders from my kitchen window. I was watching a Fox Sparrow on my gravel driveway when two smaller sparrows about 8 feet away cought my eye. At first I thought they were both Chipping Sparrows. On closer observation I realized the one bird was quite different. My vantage point was from above the bird and about 8-10 feet away. I observed a dark (brown, crown with black streaking and a distinct buffy central crown stripe the entire length of the crown. This bird had lighter gray on the nope and sides of the neck, The back was more gray than brown and had black streaks, The bird was lighter underneath-more white or baff than gray. The bird had a distinct cheek patch and an obvious white malar stripe between the ear patch and a faint, dark medic whister stripe. I was unable to get a clear look at the rump tos the bird had its winger tolded over it) but I did not see any confrost

between the rump and the back.

I was only able to watch the bird for about two minutes before it flushed. Neither it nor the Chipping Sporrow returned, the Fox Sparrow however did.
