Who found the bird first: Margaret Higbee

The five of us were observing a flock of migrants which included Field, Song, Swamp, and Whitethroated Sparrows, Yellow-rumped and Blackpoll Warblers, and Rusty Blackbirds when I spotted a very orangish sparrow perched in a shrub no more than 30 feet distant and about 6 feet high. I immediately put the bird in my scope to make sure everyone saw it. It was very cooperative as it kept the original position for at least 5 minutes—long enough for everyone to take turns at the scope and study field marks. The bird was facing us, and we first noted the bird's flat-headedness and a "Pectoral Sandpiper-like" break where the streaking and buffiness of the breast met the white belly. The breast beneath the orange was streaked as were the flanks. The throat contrasted with the breast and was lighter buffy. It had a black stripe behind the eye with a wide orangish supercilium. The cheeks and the nape appeared greenish gray. The crown was dark with a grayish median stripe. The bird's wings were very reddish. The bird flew into another shrub about 50 feet away, but we were able to get the bird once again in the scope. From this angle we could see the white stripes on the back as the bird had its back toward us. Once again everyone took turns looking through my scope. The bird dropped down for a few minutes out of sight, but we decided to just wait instead of approaching. We were fortunate for it flew a third time and once again we had a head-on view from a distance of about 75 feet in yet another shrub. The total observation time was at least 15 minutes, possibly 20.

We eliminated LeConte's Sparrow as a possibility when we saw the very white streaks on the bird's back. In addition, the median crown stripe was not white. We eliminated Saltmarsh Sharp-tailed Sparrow because of the amount of reddish in the wings and the overall brightness of the bird as well as the definite break between the orange breast and the white belly.
