Thanks for resubmitting, with further details, your sighting of a Boat-tailed Grackle from southern Chester County on March 18, 1995. As you mention in your letter, the sighting has significance not only in being a first Chester County record, but in being one of the very few for Pennsylvania, in fact the first in almost twenty years. I personally feel that sightings of Boat-tailed Grackle in southeastern PA are overdue, especially with the species expanding range northward as evidenced with sightings in nearby Cumberland and Salem Counties New Jersey. I have always speculated to myself that the next record would be either once again from the Tinicum area or the lower Delaware River area. Southern Chester County is just a short distance as the crow flies, or in this case, as the grackle flies, from its northern Delaware Bay range.

I will gladly pass along your updated report to PORC for its consideration. I haven't been to a recent DVOC meeting because of a change in my work schedule, but I will look for you the next time I attend a meeting.

Dear Nick:

When I sent Frank Haas a note for <u>Cassinia</u> on having seen a Boat-tailed Grackle in southern Chester County on March 18, 1995, my intent was that the observation would make a good local note for the next issue. It was not written with the thought that it be submitted to P.O.R.C. Has I so intended, more details would have been furnished, for, as you stated in your letter of June 1996 rejecting the record, "the details submitted were not adequate enough to support the identification."

Now, because (1) the note was not published in <u>Cassinia</u>, (2) there are just two Pennsylvaina sight records mentioned in the Santner, Brauning and Schwalbes 1992 <u>Annotated List</u>, one by George Lamb and Johnny Miller at Tinicum on December 13, 1957 and a "probable" seen on a Lower Bucks CBC on December 17, 1977, and (3) I have been urged by Dan Brauning to reopen the matter, I am herewith submitting the following additional remarks.

The fact that I observed Boat-tailed Grackles in New Jersey or Delaware on 17 different occasions in 1995 and on 15 in 1996 does certainly suggest that I should be credited with a familiarity with the species.

There is only one species in the eastern United States with which a male Boat-tail could possibly be confused, the Common Grackle, but the major differences in size and voice make the separation easy. My male bird, perched atop a thirty foot tree, looked the sizeof a Fish Crow. A Common Grackle also present at the pond made the size comparison simple. As for voice, my bird was "singing" two or three times a minute a varied repertoire of wheezes, whistles, rattles and a gulping sound accompanied by raised neck feathers, totally unlike the Common Grackle's much briefer and more miserable effort, which the National Geographic book describes well as a short "koguba leek."
