Foraging on the ground with other sparrows, including an adult White-crowned Sparrow of the nominate subspecies, in an area with spread seeds. When alarmed, the sparrows would dive into the bush for cover.

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)

Although David Sibley in his blog (see below) states that "immatures [are] effectively indistinguishable" bewtween gambelii and the nominate subspecies, the Blooming Glen bird shows classic "Gambel's" features and, to my eye, does not show any signs of intermediacy/intergradation which would cause concern for the identification. Moreover, the yellow-orange bill color of this bird, which was very evident (even more so than the blank loral pattern), perfectly matches that of "Gambel's" and is unlike the "darker pink [bill] without yellow or orange tones" of the

expected nominate subspecies.
