## Dear Ward,

Thank you for submitting documentation on the California Gull at Florence on 12 March 1997 and the Thayer's Gull on the Delaware River on 28 April 1997. Committee members had differing views about the reports, and balloting went two rounds on both. Ultimately, after careful review, the committee decided that it cannot accept the records.

On the California, a majority believed that the details submitted were not conclusive to add this rarity to the Pennsylvania list. Various features including its distinctive shape and jizz make a California likely, but most members felt that acceptance would require more precise information about various characters such as the outer primary pattern from above and below in flight, and the shade of the mantle indicating which race was involved. Because identifying this species outside its usual range is seldom if ever obvious, a series of photographs may be necessary before it can be added to the state list.

On the Thayer's, three members approved the record and four did not. Though most details were appropriate for Thayer's including your illustration of the upper primaries, those voting no were troubled by several items: 1. The extent of black described on the under-primaries appeared to be too great for Thayer's. 2. In flight Thayer's generally appears longer-winged than shorterwinged in flight than Herring (relative to body length and wing width). 3. At rest Thayer's typically has a primary extension equal to or slightly longer, not shorter, than a Herring (relative to tail length). One member felt that the distinction from a small female Herring was not conclusive.

The committee emphasizes that non-acceptance does not mean that the bird was not the species reported, but rather that the committee believes the documentation submitted does not support the identification conclusively.

We hope that this will not discourage you from submitting documentation on any rarities you may find in the future.

Finally, the committee apologizes for the unacceptably long delay before all members were able to vote on the record. Circumstances beyond our control caused the problem, and we believe that we are back on a timely track.

NOTES TAKEN ON SITE ARE WITH THIS REPORT.
THE BIRD
AGE - adult in alternate plumage
BIRD AT REST ON WATER
BILL - shorter and thinner than Herring Gull. Light yellow with red gongs spot. In some light bill hinted toward greenish.
HEAD - bright white, rounded and small when compared to the Herring Gulls.
EYE - all dark. Orbital looked dark, but I couldn't see the color. MANTLE - about the same gray as Herrings, in some light a bit darker. It never looked lighter than a Herring.
SECONDARIES, TERCIALS, AND COVERTS - same as mantle. Some white at bottom edge of tercials and secondaries.
PRIMARIES - black, same as Herring Gulls. White windows slightly larger than Herrings. Black on the outside primary went under the secondaries as it does in a Herring. Less primary extension than Herrings. (I've compared this individual with about 10 different adult Iceland Gulls that have been present from time to time. Only one even approached the primary pattern on this bird. That Iceland or intergrade had a dark eye and the primaries were charcoal, not black. The charcoal on the outer primary did not reach under the secondaries. Another factor was the mantle color, which was lighter than a Herring.
UNDERPARTS, CHEST, AND TAII - bright white.
LEGS AND FEET - very deep pink toward purple.
BIRD WITH RAISED WINGS AND IN FLIGHT - it raised its wings a bunch of times and flew around a bit before traveling to the dump.

PRIMARIES FROM "OUT TO IN" ON UPPERWING I cant get my mind around numbering them in the other direction.

1. not black near tip but white well down the shaft, them black it
2. the black approached the coverts on the forward half of the feather. Black crossed the whole feather near the tip. The tip was white.
3. similar to \#2. Wider black across the feather near the tip. Black on the forward part of the feather extended less for the \#2 4. similar to \#3 but again less for up the wing.
$5 \& 6$. white tipped with some black. Couldn't see them very well. GENERAL JIZZ OF PRIMARIES - fairly extensive black in primaries, but not as much a a Herring Gull. Again, as black as a herring. UNDERERWING - much the same pattern as underwing. Not as solid black on the out two or three primaries as a Herring.
JIZZ IN FLIGHT - shorter winged than Herring. Again showed black in primaries much greater than even the darkest Iceland I've seen.

VOICE - single calls, between calls it closed it mouth.
THE HISTORY OF THIS INDIVIDUAL OR AT LEAST ONE LIRE IT. I've been seeing this bird for upwards of 2 months on and off. Several times I've tried to show it to other observers but it tends to blend so well with Herring Gulls that they couldn't pick it out. The other problem was the number of gulls on the river earlier in the season; thousands floating by. It was so easy to lose I never did get a complete look at it until Monday.

The bird was initially picked out Monday by it's slightly smaller size, short primary extension, round head, dark eye, and smaller blunt light yellow bill. Among several Herring Gulls it was floating slowly downriver. Frankly I was not 100\% sure it was not a very small strange Herring until it raised it's wings and rolled on it's side to reveal leg color. I was able to stay with the bird for nearly a half hour by moving down the walkway in the park. Evenually it took wing and flew around the river in front of me for a minute or so, and then retired to the dump.

I've now examined thousands of Herring Gulls and dozens of Iceland Gulls at Florence since January. Frankly there have been several good candidates for first and 2nd winter Thayer's Gulls at Florence: these birds had the dark tercials. This is the only adult bird $I$ 've seen in New Jersey that $I$ couldn't pass off as a dark Iceland or an intergrade. Even the darkest Icelands don't pass on a quick look as a Herring Gull. It's easy to see why Thayer's was once lumped with Herring Gull. The tendency is to go from the other direction, making an Iceland into a Thayer's. Another problem can be first winter Herring Gulls going into first summer: many have translucent primaries from underneath. I guess you don't need to hear all this.
