Details of sighting and description: Ben Coulter and I were conducting the waterbird count when I noticed and all dark gull-like bird cruise past Sunset Point. I never spotted it coming, so I did not see a good side profile, but did see the shape and flight behavior well. It flew on stiff strongly arched wings with slow steady wing beats. The wings were pointed and angled back and curved downward giving the bird a rather arched look. The upperside and underside looked all blackish. The flight was very falcon-like, a strong, fast, and steady flight. Since I didn't get on the bird until it was past me, I was not able to see the white patches at the bases of the primaries.

I strongly suspect the jeager was a Parasitic Jaeger based upon its falcon-like shape and behavior. Pomarine Jaegers are more robust with broader based wings and slower flight and are less buoyant. This bird was too heavy and the wings were too braod for a Long-tailed Jaeger.
