	<p>Unfortunately, the bird died a couple of days later. A picture is attached taken by Zach Boles who is another volunteer at the Aark. I think the picture should be adequate for the documentation. If not good enough, I can ask Nate Rice at the Academy of Natural Sciences to document the specimen more scientifically.</p>

Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)	<p>I am no expert, but it most closely matches the Dovekie in Sibley and in pictures I found on the Internet.</p>
Discussion - anything else relevant to the observation that will aid the committee in evaluating it:	<p>On 12/20 and 12/21 there were strong winds and heavy rain overnight. At Cape May Point, 31 Dovekies and 9 Razorbills were observed leaving Delaware Bay in the early morning of 12/21. The Dovekie count was reported as a modern day record per a post to the NJ ABA Birding News site. A similar occurrence in 1932 referred to as a "wreck" of Dovekies in the same post provided one of two other Bucks Co. records. The specimen was given to the Academy of Natural Sciences in good condition.</p>
