<b>Habitat</b>	Rose Valley Lake is a 389 acre reservoir managed by the PA Fish and Boat Commission and one of the best all-around birding sites in the area. The bird was located along a grassy/brushy bank on the northeast portion of the lake. There are cattails along the edge of the water in that section, but the bird was never observed in those, seeming to prefer the drier grass away from the water.
<b>Distance to bird</b>	10 to 15 feet
<b>Viewing conditions</b>	Nothing terribly notable with the weather. A calm, pleasant day. Viewing the bird only hampered by its tendency of hiding, so views were through grass/brush.
<b>Optical equipment used</b>	Swarovski EL 8.5x42 Swarovision binoculars, Canon 7Dii with 100-400mm f/5.6 ii
<b>Description</b>	Sparrow with orange face showing pale auriculars and lores, purplish spots/streaks on nape, and a median crown stripe that is orangish towards the forehead and white towards the back of the head.

**Behavior (be as detailed as possible about what the bird was doing)**

It was exhibiting textbook behavior for the species. We knew essentially where it was within a small patch of habitat, and it took over two hours to get a look at it. The bird was seen running on the ground. I never saw it out in the open other than as it ran along the ground to/from cover.

**Separation from similar species (How you eliminated others)**

The orange face, pale lores and purplish spots on the nape eliminate all other sparrows

My photos are of fairly low quality due to the skulky nature of the bird, but I feel that they are diagnostic. Norwood saw the bird out in the open for several minutes, and took fantastic photos (on <https://ebird.org/view/checklist/S44785364>). I spent a few hours looking for the bird the following day (4/22/18) without success, although Norwood thinks he saw it around 6:15am that day.
